Why screen for lung cancer?

Lung cancer is the leading cause of cancer death for both men and women and is a major public health problem in the United States. There are an estimated 160,000 deaths from lung cancer in the United States each year and over 2 million worldwide.

The fight against cancer is waged on three major fronts: prevention, detection, and treatment. Early detection is necessary to improve treatment outcome and survival of lung cancer patients and those at risk for lung cancer.



What is a Computer Aided Detection System?

The Cleveland Clinic is conducting a lung cancer screening trial using a program to help detection of lung cancer on chest x-rays.



This computer-aided detection (CAD) system will be applied to chest x-rays to help with image interpretation. In the future, this technology could help screen and diagnose lung cancer at an early stage, when treatment is most effective.

What will be required of me to participate in this study?

Participants will have yearly visits, and fill out questionnaires every six months.

There are no costs to you or your insurance company for your participation. The study chest x-rays will be provided at no cost.

Who Can Participate?

- Age 40-75 years
- Have not received any treatment for lung cancer in the last five years

Plus belong to one or more of the following three categories:

- Be a current or former smoker
or
- Have a diagnosis of emphysema or chronic obstructive pulmonary disease (COPD)
or
- Have a family member (parent, sibling, or child) with a history of lung cancer

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
